Her stomach churned and tightened into a knot as fear brushed the edge of her mind. She tried again, managed to pull herself up, and stood unsteadily, afraid to take a step. Just as she tried to head back, she heard a low rumble rise to a terrifying roar. A sour stench of wetness and rot came from a gaping crack opening in the ground, like the reek of morning breath from a yawning earth. She stared uncomprehendingly at dirt and rocks, and small trees falling into the widening gap in the ground. 25

The tent, perched on the far edge of the huge crack, tilted, as half the solid ground beneath it pulled away. It teetered undecidedly, then collapsed and disappeared into the deep hole in the ground, taking the tent cover and all it contained with it.
