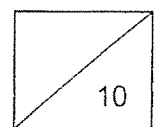

As a young girl, I remember Auntie as a figure of warmth and wisdom, always sitting by the door of our house, waiting eagerly for me to come home. She always had a tale or two to tell me. The late afternoon light would often spill across her, casting soft shadows on her weathered hands, as she recounted tales rich with emotion and wisdom. Auntie had an unparalleled gift for storytelling, and the stories she shared left an indelible impression on me. 5

In contrast, the street performers in my neighbourhood told their tales by expressing themselves exaggeratedly; with dramatic flourishes and animated gestures. Auntie required no such theatrics. Captivating me with a natural depth and sincerity in her voice alone, she was far more mesmerising than the street storytellers I had sat around to listen to. 10

Marking the start of their storytelling sessions, the street performers lit an incense stick. Once the incense stick burned out, the audience understood that it was time to disperse. I did not like this idea at all. This restricted the flow of storytelling, bringing it to an end just as I was becoming fully immersed. Each time, I found myself longing for more, unwilling to leave when the session was over. Auntie's stories had no time limit — I could listen for hours, completely absorbed. Despite hearing **them** countless times, her stories never lost their magic, wrapping me in warmth and filling me with comforting nostalgia. 15

A folktale I hear Auntie tell very often is *The Journey to Happiness* - about a young man who, despite living a comfortable life, felt an unshakable restlessness. Convinced that true happiness lay beyond his village, he set off on a journey, believing wealth and success would bring fulfillment. He crossed mountains, deserts, and bustling cities, tirelessly accumulating riches, yet an emptiness lingered. One evening, weary and disheartened, he met a wise elder who said, "Happiness is not something you chase but something you discover by embracing what you already have." Frustrated by the elder's words, the young man continued his search, unconvinced. After a long but fruitless journey, the young man finally decided to return home. 20 25

Upon his return, the young man saw his world through new eyes. He started to notice small acts of kindness from those around him, like the warmth in his mother's smile and the laughter shared over meals. Previously overlooked, **these moments** now filled him with a quiet joy. He realised happiness had never been something to find elsewhere — it had always been with him, waiting to be appreciated. From that day on, he no longer sought fulfilment in distant places but in the love and simple blessings surrounding him. 30

Many of Auntie's stories, like **this one**, taught me valuable life lessons. Even though I do not see her so often now, I still remember this story as if it were told yesterday. It taught me an important lesson. Instead of constantly pursuing what I lack, I have learned to live my life better by embracing the lessons from *The Journey to Happiness*. 35

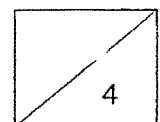

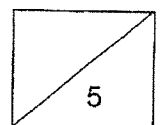

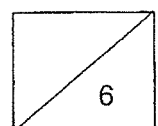
